

Dear Friends,

In last Sunday's sermon, read by Barbara Crane at Emmanuel and Steve Pekich at St. Alban's, I wrote about how Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary each honored Jesus in their own unique way. Shortly after Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead he was invited to their home for dinner. Lazarus honored Jesus by inviting him and serving as host. Martha honored Jesus by cooking and serving dinner for at least 14 men (counting Jesus' disciples). Mary honored Jesus by anointing his feet with a very expensive perfume and then wiping them with her hair. (Note, Mary is not the same woman as the sinful woman in Luke's story of a dinner at the home of Simon the Pharisee.) Jesus accepted Lazarus' invitation, ate Martha's food, and allowed Mary to anoint him. The three siblings honored our Lord in very different, yet equally moving ways.

What no one else at the table knew yet was that the next day Jesus would enter the capitol city of Jerusalem in the manner of a Jewish king and set in motion the events of Holy Week. On Palm Sunday at the end of the service we will read in parts the story of Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion. Why do we do this? Why not just wait until Good Friday? The Church, in its wisdom, knows that many Christians do not attend the services of Holy Week. Good Friday is one of the least attended services of the year. It would do no good to go from the Hosannas of Palm Sunday to the Alleluias of Easter and bypass the crucifixion. We follow a crucified and risen Lord. The Christian life is not all Hosannas and Alleluias. Following Jesus is neither automatic nor easy. For some Christians around the world the sacrifice of their life because of their faith is an ever present danger. We who do not have to worry about bodily harm as a result of our faith still are called to a life of sacrifice.

Think of sacrifice as offering a gift to God. In Jesus' case he offered the gift of his life. In response to Jesus' offering of the gift of his life we are called to offer our "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving," as the Eucharistic prayer says. We do that by offering our money and our time. We offer to God the sacrifice of our money. I have tithed since my first job because that's what my parents did and taught me to do. There are many fun ways my husband and I could spend ten percent of our paychecks over the years, but that money belongs to God. I've never been to Europe, but I have been to the mountaintop of prayer. And when my son's medical expenses were very high somehow the money was always there to pay the bills. I know that not everyone is fortunate enough to have good jobs with health insurance. Some people cannot pay the rent in full, let alone tithe their income. In such cases God gladly accepts whatever financial sacrifice you honor him with. The size of the gift doesn't matter; it's the size of your heart that counts.

We also are called to offer God the sacrifice of our time. Through corporate worship, private prayer, Bible reading and study, and other forms of study we give our time to God. We also offer our gift of time through service to others. In America we say that time is valuable. When offered to God it is valuable indeed. (continued on bottom of next page)


