

Dear Friends,

On the recommendation of several of you I am watching The Chosen and am through the first two seasons. It's available online from Angel Studios at http://new.thechosen.tv/

Now in its third season, The Chosen is a depiction of Jesus and his disciples from the perspective of the disciples. Simon Peter is the lead character, especially in Season 1. While it takes creative liberties in creating backgrounds for each disciple, and jumps back and forth between the Gospels of Matthew and John, it's worth watching for the sheer humanity of the portrayals. Here's what I mean, the disciples are portrayed as real people, not saints. Example 1: when Jesus tells them they are going to Samaria they begin to argue with him. After a few minutes Jesus says something to the effect of, "If you argue with me about every decision it's going to be very 'annoying'. How about you just trust me on this?" Example 2: There's animosity between Simon (Peter), the fisherman who is behind on his taxes and Matthew the tax collector. Simon's ill feeling doesn't magically go away once they are both Jesus' disciples. Example 3: When Jesus is with them they are much better at working as a team than when he's not with them. When he's not they argue with each other about what the plan for Jesus' ministry should be, where they should go next, and who is in charge when he's away. It's so human! and it's in line with the portrayal of the disciples in the Gospels.

Jesus, too, is portrayed more humanly than in most other productions. He gets tired, he's tender with his mother Mary, he's commanding yet kind. Much of what he says is taken from the Gospels, but the actor makes it believable. One has to be careful about not taking the show too literally, but it is inspirational, uplifting, and, for the main part, theologically sound.

One thing that struck me from a historical perspective was the constant presence of the Romans. Season one begins in Capernaum, the biblical home of fisherman Simon (Peter) and Andrew, James and John. The Jews live their lives and conduct their business under Rome's watchful eye. There's no escape. The Romans are part of the story. The Pharisees are there too, Nicodemus as a friend to Jesus and his student Shmuel as a foe who will stop at nothing to bring the "false prophet" to justice.

Take a look, I think you will find The Chosen to be worth watching.
