Dear Friends,

Over the four Tuesdays of Advent I will be writing about faith, hope, joy, and love. Today's theme is hope. Christian hope needs to be distinguished from other common uses of the word. It is not wishful thinking, as in "I hope I get the Christmas present I really want." Nor is hope wishing someone good luck, as in, "I hope you do well on the exam." Such hope is based in nothing real. Christian hope is sure and certain because it is both initiated by God and based on the power of God. We place our hope in God's promises to us. One of the strongest statements is found in Paul's letter to the Romans 8:35-39:

Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am sure that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

We never have to "hope" that God loves us, for we know that God loved us enough to send his only-begotten Son. We never have to "hope" that we are good enough to enter into paradise upon our death, for all are sinners who have fallen short of the glory of God. The night before he died for us Jesus took the cup of wine, blessed it, and gave it to his disciples saying, "Drink this all of you. This is my blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins." If you believe that through the cross of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, your sins are forgiven and you have been reconciled to God your hope is real because it is based on the promise of God in Jesus Christ. Your hope is sure and certain. Consider Ephesians 1:17-23:

I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

In God is our hope, and we shall never hope in vain.


