Dear Friends,

The upcoming Sunday Gospel is about forgiveness. Peter asks Jesus, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times." (Matthew 18:21-22) We know that this must have been an issue under discussion in Matthew's community since Peter's question mentions "a member of the church." There was no church before Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection! Although no details are given, it's clear that Matthew is doing what the church does today, applying Jesus' teachings to a current situation.

No doubt Peter believes he is being generous when he sets the limit of forgiveness at seven times instead of once or twice. Jesus' answer, however, means that there is never a limit on how many times we forgive. All will sin and fall short more times than we can count over a lifetime. We will hurt people and need to be forgiven, and we will be hurt and, hopefully, be asked for our forgiveness. So let's talk about forgiveness. First, forgiveness doesn't mean saying that the sin never happened. The consequences of sin are real and to say otherwise is wrong. Forgiveness means acknowledging the pain and its consequences and relinquishing the need to hurt back or get even. When you tell someone that you forgive them you are letting go the bad feelings instead of holding on to them. You are ridding yourself of the black spot on your heart.

Second, if a person sins against you many times you are not obligated to remain in relationship with them. Jesus doesn't ask us to suffer through physical or emotional abuse over and over again. There are times when the right thing to do is to end things and move on so healing can begin. Which leads me to the third point, forgiveness can take time, especially when you have been deeply hurt. As long as you're actively working on it you are okay with God. If you don't know where to start try praying for the person every day. Praying for someone over time changes you - not them!

Finally, forgiveness is not optional. In the Lord's Prayer we pray, "Forgive us our trespasses, [just] as we forgive those who trespass against us." God takes sin and the need for forgiveness so very seriously that he sent his only beloved Son to deal with the powers of sin and evil and death. If we seek to be forgiven, we must learn to forgive.
